SWIM SCHOOL

Students are currently attending our Swimming Safety school program at Western Suburbs pool in Unanderra. For two weeks, students participate in an intensive program which aims to help students rapidly improve their swimming ability. There is a large focus on survival skills such as treading water, back floating, and survival sequences. Students also develop their swimming strokes. Many students have already made significant progress.

We have many students who have never been in open water before. These students have persevered and demonstrated courage. We have had students progress from stepping foot in a pool for the first time, to entering the deep end with support. In our upper groups, we have had some students go from swimming five metres to swimming 50m freestyle nonstop. What an incredible leap in ability.

All parents and carers should know that the students have been exceptionally well behaved and respectful on the bus trips and at the pool.

Student Mobile Phone in Schools Policy

Further Guidance

For the purposes of this policy, 'mobile phones' includes smart watches and associated listening accessories, such as, but not limited to, headphones and ear buds.

The Department of Education does not permit student use of mobile phones in public schools unless for medical purposes.

It is important to note that it is not a requirement at Gwynneville Public School for students to have a mobile phone at school.

Gwynneville Public School recognises that an increasing number of parents/carers who for safety, security and/or emergency purposes wish to provide their children with mobile phones.

This policy details the conditions under which mobile phones are permitted at Gwynneville Public School.

Conditions of Use

- The use of mobile phones and smart watches for all students will be banned from the time they arrive at school to the conclusion of the school day. This includes before school and at break times. Students are not permitted to have mobile phones in their possession during the school day.
- Mobile phones and smart watches must be switched off and taken to the administration
 office before the school day begins and collected at the end of the school day. Gwynneville
 Public School will securely store student mobile phones during the school day.

Exemptions and Communication

- Exemptions to this ban include where a student requires a mobile phone to monitor a health condition as part of a school approved documented health care plan.
- While at Gwynneville Public School, students are the responsibility of the school. All communication between parents and students, during school hours, should occur via the school's administration.

Gwynneville Public School has duty of care for all students when they are attending the school. In emergencies, where students need to get in contact with parents/carers, students are to notify the appropriate school staff. If parents/carers need to contact their children, they are asked to contact the school directly.

Breaches of this Policy

Breaches of this policy will be managed at the discretion of the Administration staff.





Road safety

Hold your child's hand

Your child may be easily distracted and too small to be seen by drivers. They are still developing skills that help them to predict or identify dangers and may tend to act impulsively.

An adult should always be responsible for your child's safety when out and about.

Talk with your child about safe behaviour on the footpath. It's not a safe place to play as it is near the road and vehicles may be entering or exiting driveways.

Until your child is <u>at least</u> 8 years old, hold their hand:

- · on the footpath
- · in the car park
- · when crossing the road.

Then, up until <u>at least</u> 10 years old, supervise your child very closely, and hold their hand when crossing the road.

If you can't be with your child, organise for another trusted adult to accompany them.

At the end of the school day, your child may be excited, distracted or tired and often not concentrating on what is happening around them. Help keep them safe by meeting your child at the school gate. Never call them across the road.

Children learn safe road user habits from you and will continue them when they are old enough to travel alone.

Key road safety messages to share with your child in Kindergarten to Year 2

- Hold a grown up's hand when:
 - you cross the road
 - you're on the footpath
 - you're in a car park

Key road safety messages to share with your child in Years 3 to 6

- Hold an adult's hand when you cross the road (until at least 10)
- · Use a safe place to cross the road
- Stop! Look! Listen! Think! every time you cross the road and keep checking until safely across

Driving and parking safely near schools

The beginning and end of the school day are busy times around schools. That is why you need to take extra care in 40km/h school zones.

Drive safely

- Slow down to 40km/h in the school zone and stay aware of crossings.
- At a supervised crossing, follow the directions of the School Crossing Supervisor. They help manage traffic and assist children to use the crossings on roads near and outside of schools.
- Always give way to pedestrians particularly when entering and leaving driveways.

Park legally and safely

- Parking signs are planned with children's safety in mind.
- Park safely and legally, even if it means walking further to the school gate.
- Always park and turn legally around the school. U-turns and three-point turns are dangerous.
- Never double park as it puts children at risk.
- · Never park in a bus zone or in the school bus bay.

- Don't park across the school driveway or the entrance to the school car park.
- Make sure your child uses the 'Safety Door' (rear kerb side door) to get in and out of the vehicle.
- Model safe and considerate behaviour for your child – they learn from you.
- It's always a good idea to use the drop off and pick up area suggested by your school. This will help keep all children as safe as possible during the busiest times of the school day.


